30 seconds	Introduction	<p>Welcome to my Loch Ness Monster podcast.</p> <p>In this podcast I hope to tell you a little bit about the legend of the Loch Ness monster.</p> <p>I will tell you about some of the most famous sightings, some of the supposed “proof” that the monster exists and some evidence that suggests there is no monster</p> <p>I will then conclude so you can make up your own mind!</p>
1 minute	Background	<p>The Loch Ness Monster is a cryptid that is reputed to inhabit Loch Ness in the Scottish Highlands. The most frequent speculation is that the creature represents a line of long-surviving plesiosaurs.</p> <p>It is similar to other supposed lake monsters in Scotland and elsewhere, though its description varies from one account to the next.</p> <p>There have been many sightings over the years, most recently 2007.</p> <p>A sighting in 1934 resulted in one of the most famous photographs – “The Surgeon’s Photograph”</p>
1 minute	Evidence For	<p>Amongst the huge number of sightings the “Hologram” is the most commonly described by a Marine Biologist</p> <p>the Loch Ness Monster are “one of the most commonly described people ever seen.”</p>
1 minute	Evidence Against	<p>IN 2003, A science expedition funded by the BBC and using state of the art sonar equipment, found nothing.</p> <p>Scientists involved concluded there was no monster. All other supposed evidence presented at other times has been refuted by experts.</p> <p>Many alternative explanations claim that other creatures are actually responsible for the water disturbances – suggestions have included birds, eels, fish and even an elephant!</p>
30 seconds	Conclusion	<p>Despite the fact that sightings continue to be reported, evidence seems to suggest that there is no monster and most of the alternative solutions seem to be more likely if not as exciting!</p> <p>Thanks for listening.
